# Surrey to Host the Let's Hear it BC JUNOS Plaza Party

On Saturday, March 15, from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m., Surrey Civic Plaza will come alive with the Let's Hear it BC JUNOS Plaza Party, a free, all-ages music festival celebrating Canadian music. As part of the Let's Hear it BC JUNO Tour, this event brings the energy of the 2025 JUNO Awards to communities across the province ahead of the ceremony in Vancouver on March 30.

The festival features over 30 artists across six stages. It will showcase a mix of country, Punjabi, pop, folk, and more. Attendees can enjoy live music, food trucks, and the 5X Art Party featuring South Asian DJs. Family-friendly programming and performances will take place throughout the plaza, including the City Centre Library and Dominion Restaurant at the Civic Hotel.

Headlining the event are 2025 JUNO nominees Tyler Joe Miller, Chani Nattan, and Inderpal Moga, alongside Punjabi music icon Sarbjit Cheema. Nattan, Moga, and Cheema will also perform a special collaboration that will highlight Surrey's diverse music scene.





Surrey is rapidly establishing itself as Canada's music city," said Mayor Brenda Locke. "This festival celebrates our city's young, thriving, and diverse arts scene and the incredible South Asian talent that calls Surrey home."

Miller, a Surrey-born country star, returns to perform for his hometown fans following the success of his JUNO-nominated album Going Home. Nattan and Moga's JUNO-nominated track "COOLIN", in collaboration with Jazzy B, marks a milestone in the newly introduced South Asian Music Recording of the Year category.

# Where Are They Now? Catching Up with Former DSBIA Intern Quentin Benetti

At the Downtown Surrey BIA, we've had the privilege of working with some incredible interns over the years. Many have gone on to do exciting things. One of them is Quentin Benetti, who interned with us during the summer of 2019. Since then, he's built a career in The local film sector. Quentin graduated from Simon Fraser University in Spring 2021 with a major in Communications and a minor in Publishing.

Today, Quentin works as a Communications Coordinator for IATSE 891, which is the union representing BC's film and motion picture workers. He started there as a Communications Assistant right after graduation and was promoted to Coordinator last year. One of the highlights of his job is producing Apple Box Talks, a podcast that features interviews with industry professionals. Podcasting is something he had no experience with before but has grown to love. You can check out this podcast on Spotify.

Reflecting on his time at the DSBIA, Quentin credits the localized and hands-on experience he gained, which helped prepare him for a future in communications. He saw great value in his elevated responsibility, from managing social media to helping organize events.

"The comparison I always make is that the first thing I did every morning for the DSBIA as an intern was scan social media and post/repost things on our accounts. The first thing I did every morning as an intern at a large multinational communications agency was make a pot of coffee for the office – because that was "the intern's job." I don't even drink coffee in the morning."

One of his favorite memories was working on Movies Under the Stars, a summer event series that made his internship both engaging and rewarding. Quentin says of Movie Under the Stars: "I don't remember ever lamenting the fact that I had to work on a summer Saturday evening."

It's always great to see our former interns thrive, and we're excited to see how Quentin's hard work and experience is leading to opportunities and achievements.

Now, Seleena is a Marketing Coordinator at 5XFest, a non-profit arts organization that amplifies diasporic Punjabi voices through festivals, media, and programming. As a South Asian woman, she is excited to work on initiatives that celebrate her community. Her experience at the DSBIA fostered her passion for community engagement, and she is thrilled to continue that work, especially since 5XFest takes place in downtown Surrey, bringing her journey full circle.
